



Wedding Policy at St. Paul's

--from Tim

Several of us, including Susan Ohanneson, our Wedding Director, have been working on wedding guidelines, which will be available soon.

In the meantime, I'd like to introduce you to the Wedding Director's "job description" and how we will handle weddings at St. Paul's.

Susan will

- have the initial conversation with the couple, whether parishioners or nonparishioners.
- Before agreeing to and booking a wedding, she will contact the appropriate people: priest-in-charge (Tim: clergy for parishioner weddings); assistant minister (Deb: clergy for non-parishioner weddings); assistant warden (Lori: for facilities use); and

- St. Paul's office and webmaster (for calendaring).
- Susan will be responsible for the management and care of the facilities prior to, during, and after a wedding. In other words, she will supervise the pre-wedding setup, oversee matters during the wedding, and take care of closing up and after-use cleaning.
- Except for necessary clergy involvement (counseling, liturgy, etc.), only Susan will deal with the wedding party and guests. Questions and concerns by our staff will go to Susan.
- At each stage of the wedding, Susan will be in contact with the appropriate person/s about the facilities, etc.

We have agreed on a flat \$500 donation for parishioners, which we will ask the Bishop's Committee to approve (this represents about 75% off "market value," which we will ask for non-parishioner weddings). The donation includes:

- \$100: use of sanctuary
- \$100: use of Grace Hall
- \$100: clergy honorarium
- \$100: wedding director
- \$100: cleaning

St. Paul's Copier and Computer Policy. March 8, 2014.

Fellow parishioners,

We continue to work our way into our new facilities.

As part of our ongoing efforts, Tim is appointing Lori our office tech; she will be in charge of the computer and copier. On the managerial flow chart we're developing (coming to you soon), she will work with Deb, who is the clergy office manager.

Because of some accidental expenses we've incurred, I have asked the office staff (Stephanie, Elaine, Vada, Hank, and Amanda) not to do anything with the copier except print and change paper without first contacting Lori. In other words, office staff will not change the ink cartridge, or computer software, etc.

Because of excessive paper usage, <u>only</u> office staff, clergy, and wardens are to copy. They will be issued codes and are not to share them.

Because color copies are much more expensive, <u>codes</u> <u>will be only for black and white</u>. Only Lori will have the color code.

Any ministry wishing to have copies made will need to make arrangements in advance. Large printings will need to be approved by the Priest-in-Charge and Bishop's Warden.

At some point each ministry will have a code so we can track copies and more efficiently budget for each group's associated expenses, just as CSUB does.

Because of expense, <u>St. Paul's will not do any printing</u> <u>for outside groups</u> (meetings, weddings, funerals, etc.) without prior approval from the Priest-in-Charge and Bishop's Warden.

This policy, like all policies, is subject to review and changes.

Human Trafficking not in our neighborhood? THINK AGAIN!

Presentation on Human Trafficking Monday, April 7 at 7:00 PM St. Philip the Apostle Church 7100 Stockdale Highway



Theresa Flores, a survivor of human trafficking and author of The Sacred Bath: An American Teen's Story of Modern Day Slavery and The Slave Across the Street, will be here to speak about

the hidden evils of human trafficking (Modern Day Slavery) in our cities and neighborhoods across the nation. She is a licensed social worker and has been featured on a number of television shows including Dateline and America's Most Wanted.

As a high school student living in an upscale Detroit neighborhood, Theresa found herself snared into trafficking as a sex slave. Amazingly, she was allowed to live at home while being "on-call" every single night under a cloud of unimaginable fear that she, or members of her family, would be severely harmed if she told anyone or refused to accept the "call."
